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## MEET THE LEADER: FAYE JOHNSTONE

I am one of the Deputy Headteachers here at Loseley with responsibility for Inclusion, Equality and Diversity, Pupil Premium and Pedagogy. At Loseley, we are passionate about our children becoming responsible citizens who can build meaningful relationships and keep themselves safe. Part of my role this year is working with our SENDCo, Emma Baker, on PSHE (Personal, Social & Health Education) and Citizenship which are key threads within our curriculum and go beyond the school gates.

Developing the relationship between school and home is key to ensuring our children can live the school values of aspiration, compassion and integrity. Our experience tells us that homework is viewed very differently by different families: some wanting their children to be given lots of work to do at home whilst others feel that home should be about spending time with family. At Loseley Fields we believe that learning at home

should consist of a balance of tasks in order to develop well-rounded young people prepared for the next stages of their educational journey.

Our <u>Home Learning Policy</u> outlines how we use our home learning to go beyond traditional homework to demonstrate our values outside of school. You will therefore see a mixture of activities from reading, phonics and other curriculum-based learning (all designed to link with prior knowledge) as well as other tasks that demonstrate citizenship and our school values such as supporting their family, work within the local community and other tasks that promote positive parent and child interactions.

In school, we are using the language of our values to help children to recognise how they are living the values in their school life. It would be wonderful to hear our parents and carers using our values to support children in understanding their behaviour outside of school and our home learning grids are a great place to start!
